We are pleased to report that residents are continuing to volunteer for this worthwhile project but more are still needed.

Around 85% of people who suffer a cardiac arrest could survive if they are treated quickly with a defibrillator. But their chances of survival decrease by 10% for every minute that defibrillation is delayed. Community First Responder schemes operate very successfully in many places and can save the lives of sufferers by bridging the gap between a 999 call and the arrival of paramedics. Therefore, the Parish Council has obtained a grant to purchase the necessary equipment to set up a Community Responder scheme in Wolvey but, as the West Midlands Ambulance Service has had problems in providing the training, deadlines have been extended.

Community Responders can be anyone aged between 18 and 70, who is reasonably fit and healthy. No previous experience or medical knowledge is needed as training is provided.

## Recycling - check it, then bin it

Rugby residents are consistently beating the high recycling targets set before the new three bin system was introduced. Back in April, every household in the borough switched to the new system of a blue-lidded bin for dry recyclables, the green bin for garden and food waste and a black bin for residual waste. The scheme is going well, with residents regularly recycling more than 56 per cent of their rubbish.

However, a small minority - probably without realising - are jeopardising whole lorry loads of recyclables. They appear to be hiding ordinary waste at the bottom of their green bins.



## Reporting problems

Wolvey Parish Council is always willing to assist and support members of the community when problems are brought to its attention and will, of course, continue to do this.

However, many of the things reported to the Parish Council are actually the responsibility of either Rugby Borough Council or Warwickshire County Council and members of the public are able to report these directly to their relevant departments, without reference to the Parish Council.

Their websites contain forms which enable reports to be made on-line and links to these websites are available on the Wolvey website. Alternatively, **residents can telephone directly on the numbers that are given on the sheet enclosed in this newsletter.** We have also added contact details of the police and our 'Safer Neighbourhoods' team.



This means that when the load is tipped into the collection vehicle, the bagged waste contaminates a whole load which can not be sent for recycling. Instead the load must be sent to landfill. Some residents are also collecting their dry recycling in plastic bags and putting them into their blue-lid bins.

Councillor Heather Timms, portfolio holder for the Sustainable Environment, said: "We are really grateful to the vast majority of people across Rugby who are really helping us smash our recycling targets. Unfortunately, there are a few people who are putting non-recyclable waste into their green bins and rendering not just their own recyclable waste - but potentially a whole lorry load unsuitable. We would urge people to contact us if they need help with their waste, rather than contaminate good recyclable loads."

## Clean up - or land yourself in it!

Dog owners who fail to clean up after their pet pooches are being warned they could be nabbed. Rugby Borough Council is set to tackle the dirty problem in a targeted campaign against dog waste later this year. From December, the dog warden and other members of the Council's environmental protection team will be going on a crusade to catch repeat offenders. Officers will be patrolling some of the borough's dirtiest grotspots in an attempt to catch errant owners in the act. If caught owners face shelling £80 for a fixed penalty notice or going to court and receiving a fine of up to £1,000 and a criminal record.

Councillor Heather Timms, portfolio holder for the sustainable environment, said: "This is a problem all over the borough and is not confined to just the town or the countryside. It is disgraceful that people think it is acceptable to walk their dogs and let them foul in public and walk off without cleaning up. It may not be the most rewarding aspect of dog ownership, but it is the owner's responsibility to clean up after their pet and put the bags in waste bins or take it home, and those that do not are committing a criminal act." Waste bags need not be expensive - they can be purchased quite inexpensively from supermarkets. In fact, nappy sacks are often a lot cheaper than proprietary doggie bags and just as convenient.



"I would urge all dog owners to carry scoop bags with them whenever they leave the house with their dogs. After all, dogs are not robots and you never know when they might embarrass you".

## Wolvey Neighbourhood Watch

Neighbourhood Watch is the best known and most effective example of the community working together to prevent crime, reduce the fear of crime and improve the quality of life.



In addition to making your home safer and a more secure place to live, you could also help to make your neighbourhood a safer place for everyone. Statistics from leading insurance companies show that houses in active Neighbourhood Watch Schemes have a 1 in 344 chance of being burgled compared to the national average of 1 in 45. As a result, many insurance companies offer reduced premiums to people who are actively involved in a Neighbourhood Watch scheme,

The next meeting of the Wolvey Neighbourhood Watch will be held on **Wednesday February 10<sup>th</sup> at 7.30pm** in the **Millennium Building**. The police provide information about recent problems and successes and offer advice on simple measures to improve home security.

You are also invited to join the Warwickshire Police Community Alert Scheme. This is a new free service where the Police will send you messages to keep you updated about any relevant criminal or suspicious activity in your area.

## Boardwalk extended by busy group

2009 is almost over, but what a successful year it was for the Environment Group. Many awards were won, endless tasks, both large and small were tackled and completed, but most importantly the group stayed intact and friendly.

**Wolvey Parish Council was awarded a grant of £3762 from the Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE) COMMA fund, the Community Aggregates Fund** (more details can be found on [www.wolvey.org](http://www.wolvey.org)). As a result of this grant, it has been possible for a new **extension of the boardwalk** to be constructed by volunteers of the Wolvey Environment Group. The boardwalk extension over the cattle bridge in the wetland has now been constructed, funded by the **Comma Aggregate Fund**. It opens up a whole new area for our delight. A shaded woodland path, with superb views across open fields; a magical place, with fungi, woodland flowers, and where in summer a myriad of insect life is present, completed by a background of trickling water from the tributary.

## Clerk's Corner

It seems that people do not always understand the role of the Parish Council. The Parish Council must abide by the law and obey a strict set of rules called Standing Orders (these are available to view on the Parish Council. This is important because it gives the Parish Council credibility and therefore, hopefully, more influence with the principal authorities when necessary. The Quality Parish Council award adds additional weight to this and means that people can be assured that the council is acting properly.

But much of the work of the Parish Council is really to encourage and support the efforts of local volunteers. The Parish Council's role is to take a lead and make it possible for local groups to carry out their activities. The Council can do this by setting up working parties of volunteers (such as the Environment Group and the Summer Festival committee) so that events can take place for the whole community. The entry to the Best Village Competition is an opportunity for local groups to celebrate and promote the work they do. The Christmas tree is intended to bring people together and provide a focus during the dark winter nights. It is all part of helping to maintain a caring and active community. \*

The Parish Council has the power to request funds, called the Parish Precept, from Rugby Borough Council. Every year in November, the Parish Council holds a budget meeting when it decides on how

much money it will need to perform its statutory functions and also to provide for the needs and wishes of local residents. The amount requested is then divided between all the households in the Parish and added to the council tax. The Parish Council is always very conscious of its responsibility to provide value for the money it receives. Much debate takes place in order to balance the needs of the community whilst keeping the precept to a minimum. **At this year's budget meeting it was decided that, for the second year running, there will be no increase in the Parish Precept for 2010-11.**

However, the Parish Council recognises the importance of local community groups so it has been careful to maintain the financial assistance it provides to them. These include the maintenance of the burial grounds of Wolvey Church, Wolds Lane cemetery and the Baptist Chapel as well as a contribution towards the running costs of the Village Hall and Playing Fields, Baby & Toddlers, Wolvey Scouts, Wolvey Brownies and the Over 60's Club. It is hoped that, in this way, the Parish Council is providing a valuable contribution to maintaining these important aspects of community life.
